To date, our academies have given out thousands of lunches in total, shared breakfast club grants, helped parents access the free school meal vouchers, given food bank referrals and supported many families in applying for universal credit or accessing other help. I'd like to remind all parents and carers that all of our academies are open between 9.00am – 3.00pm, so please telephone if you think we can help.

Day to day, the children attending the academies have been enjoying lots of different activities. I know each academy is sharing photos or videos with our children and all of you at home. I think it is truly heartening to see photographs of the many paintings, rainbows, art work and the different family learning. Whilst I recognise that it is, and will be, a difficult time for us all, by continuing to care about each other and share the nice moments, we will get through this and have lots to look back on when this pandemic ends.

Research has shown the positive impact fluent readers can have across all areas of their learning, as it aides comprehension and understanding, as well as reading stamina. Using the Trust-wide 'Book of the Year' (see later in the newsletter) and carefully chosen texts, children are also engaging in a variety of activities that help improve their understanding and comprehension of texts, as well as improve their oracy.







# Key Stage 2 SEND

We launched into Spring term with a bang as 2A and 5S focussed on the same curriculum with an Earth and Space theme! Designing and making rockets that could be launched using compressed air was our challenge...we enjoyed an exciting afternoon as the rockets took off from their launch pad.

Moving into the Spring term, we also celebrated a number of children from 2A joining 5S for Maths. This has been a triumph for them and everyone is very proud of their achievements. We have been delighted that some have achieved 100% in their Times Tables Rock star tests. Keep up the hard work.

# 9th-13th March 2020: 'Our diverse planet'

Pennyman Primary Academy took part in British Science Week 2020 alongside thousands of other schools across the whole of the UK with the aim of celebrating science, engineering, technology and maths (STEM). Throughout the week, each year group studied a famous scientist, researched a STEM career and completed a science investigation. The children were captivated by the works and life of scientists Mae Jemison, Louis Pasteur, Marie Curie, David Attenborough, Margaret Hamilton and Stephen Hawking. They were inspired learning about the roles of: a vet, nurse, dentist, zoologist, engineer and forensic scientist. Our team of Pennyman scientists, technologists, engineers and mathematicians have produced a wonderful whole academy display, which includes their discoveries about sneezes, rainbows, fingerprints, surviving Antarctica and more.

# Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths at Wilton

It has been a busy term at Wilton, with lots of exciting learning and events taking place. We welcomed Inspiron Learning into the academy to bring our STEM day to life where we spent a day, learning all about the impact that plastic is having on our lives and in the oceans.

The children listened to and learned from four different presenters, the first led a construction challenge, using marshmallows and spaghetti to create their own oil rig structures. All children worked incredibly well with their group, which had children from Reception to Y6 in. The structures were then tested to see how strong they were.

After this, we found out about the effect pollution is having on our oceans. The children then had to think carefully about how they could use the 'rubbish' their families generate to create new and useful products.

These practical, real life learning opportunities continue our Silver Guilt Science Quality Mark, work too.







# Green fingered pupils

Now that Spring is here, our gardening club has stepped up its presence in the academy and village. We now have two groups, KS1 and KS2, who work with Mr Hunter to improve the look of the academy as well as learn about how to grow plants and vegetables and how to keep the garden healthy and plants happy. One of the jobs the group have undertaken was a litter pick around the site and the local area. It is safe to say, the message has since been well and truly shared with the academy and wider community.

We are hopeful that in the coming weeks, our planting will commence with vegetables and plants being planted ready to share with the community.




